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REMOVING BARRIERS TO LEARNING



150 families assisted

Providing support to students and families when they need it the most.

Student and family needs evolved during a school year filled with virtual, hybrid and inperson learning. Kid Booster Anonymous helped students in time of need, as it always has. Naperville 203 social workers and counselors identify at-risk students in need of support for educational, physical or social-emotional growth. When no other avenues of funding within the family and community exist, staff reach out to NEF. **Thanks to your generosity, the program continues to be a safety net for our students.**

The Kid Booster Crisis Fund, created as part of Kid Booster Anonymous, met increased and immediate needs for the families in our community most vulnerable to the overall impact of the virus. Both funds support the most at-risk students in our community, including the 17% of Naperville 203's 16,100 students who qualify for free and reduced lunch, and the 1% of our students who are homeless.




